Peace and unity on the eve of the new Parish Hall?

Dear Members and Friends of Pilgrim Lutheran Church,

Thanks be to God, we are very close to using our new Parish Hall with Sunday School Classrooms (its blessing is now tentatively set for the end of the Divine Service on July 9th)! Thanks also go to, but are not limited to, all the members of the Capital Improvements Committee, especially chairman Steven Sampson, who has tirelessly served for the longer-than-expected duration of the project, and member Carl Gardner, who, over the more than two years that the whole multi-phase project has been underway, regularly has been on site coordinating with contractors. (In some cases Steven and Carl especially have undeservedly suffered the brunt of our frustrations with the progress or lack thereof.) Thanks further extend to countless volunteers who have given of their time in various ways over the years, some of whom were here at the start but are no longer in the area to see the fruits of their labors, and others of whom missed the project's start but have helped bring it to completion at its end. And finally, we thank all those who have helped support the project with their prayers and offerings, without which, humanly speaking, the project would not have been or continue to be possible.

In some ways it is hard to believe that it has been more than two years since, after many months of planning, we moved out of the old Parish Hall on Memorial Day weekend of 2015, for the project's first phase, converting it into the new Office Area. When that work was largely completed by the end of that summer, we were quick to break ground, with eventual hopes that the old Office Building would be gone and that we would be in the new Parish Hall by Easter of 2016. But, bureaucratic delays and other setbacks kept work from beginning in earnest for nearly one year. Then, after a flurry of activity beginning in autumn of 2016, the final increments at least seemed to take forever, dashing hopes of occupancy in time for Easter 2017 and other dates since. Yet, in the end, we will occupy the building in God's way and time (if not this month, surely by Easter 2018!).

Two years ago there was nearly but not quite unanimous support for going forward with the remodel of the old Parish Hall and construction of the new Parish Hall. And, as we have proceeded, those who dissented, to my knowledge, have continued participating in the life of the congregation as directed by the majority of the Voters at the time. Such significant decisions by a congregation are perhaps seldom truly unanimous, and the past dissenters' submission to the will of the majority is a good example for all of us as we go forward together, perhaps facing the

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results of other decisions that we individually may not like but with which in the end we at least in some sense ought to agree and to which we at least ought to submit ourselves.

In the Body of Christ that is the Church in this place, our individual wills and pride yield to the will of the majority and the glory of God on all matters other than our teaching and practice of the Christian faith, which are normed first by Holy Scripture and second by the Lutheran Confessions. At times there may need to be division over teaching and practice, but there should never be division over lesser matters, including the personality of a pastor, the servant through whom both we come to believe and God gives growth to His Church (see 1 Corinthians 11:18-19; 1:10-12; and 3:3-8).

If we are at Pilgrim for the right reasons of seeking and receiving the forgiveness of sins, by grace through faith in Jesus Christ crucified for us, in the ways that He has given for us to receive His forgiveness, set in the context of the historic Christian liturgy and timeless Christian hymnody, then we recognize everything else as of lesser importance and submit our individual wills and pride to the will of the majority and the glory of God, we work through the organizational structures of the congregation, we give and accept reproof when and where they are necessary, we live in the forgiveness of sins that we first receive from God and then extend to one another, thereby working through our lesser differences, and we joyfully and sacrificially from our first-fruits support the work not only of specific projects or causes but also of all of God's Kingdom in this place, with the abundance of time, talent, and treasure with which He has blessed us.

If we let them, the gifts God gives us all here in this place will bring about the peace and unity in the Body of Christ that He desires for us. Those gifts will lead us to love and serve Him and our neighbor, making use of the facilities with which ultimately He has blessed us here, to the building up of His Kingdom in this place and to the glory of His Name, here now and in eternity forever.



July is the first full month of approximately six months of Sundays after Pentecost that are considered the non-festival or Church half of the Church year (compared to the festival or Christ's half of the Church year). We might say that this is a season of parables and miracles, for the somewhat continuous reading of St. Matthew's Divinely-inspired Gospel account has us hear of Jesus's telling a number of parables and performing a number of miracles, even as our hearing those becomes a part of His telling those parables to us and performing miracles in our time.

Jesus's saying and doing things for us can be a short summary of His life and continued work through the Church today (Acts 1:1-2). While parables and miracles were not new to Jesus and are not the extent of His Words and deeds, one-third of Jesus's teaching is said to be in parable form, and, by one count, He performed a representative sample of some 35 miracles (see John 20:30-31): healing, command over the forces of nature, and bringing back to life the dead (most told in more than one if not all four Gospel accounts). Parables and miracles are part of Jesus's teaching and revealing Himself as the one-time mystery of God's Kingdom, with the intention that faith will result in those who hear and see, although sadly such was not always the case then, nor is it always the case now. Ultimately, such words and deeds relate to summaries of the Church's practice (Acts 2:42-43, 46-47), to how the *Small Catechism* divides the six chief parts of Christian doctrine, and to the two parts of the Divine Service (that is, the Service of the Word and the Service of the Sacrament).

July's Sundays after Pentecost, their dates and Gospel Readings (according to *Lutheran Service Book* 3-year Series A) are listed below.

- Fourth Sunday (07/02): faith in Jesus divides people (Matthew 10:34-42)
- Fifth Sunday (07/09): Jesus invites all to Him for rest (Matthew 11:25-30)
- Sixth Sunday (07/16): Jesus sows different spiritual soils (Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23)
- Seventh Sunday (07/23): Jesus tells a parable about weeds (Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43)
- Eighth Sunday (07/30): Jesus speaks of His giving all for us (Matthew 13:44-52)

Regardless of the season or day, everyone is always invited and welcome in person at Pilgrim Lutheran Church, and you can read and hear any of the sermons preached at Pilgrim at <http://www.pilgrimlc.org/sermons>.

June Reading prompts July Judges Q&A

We continue to recommend that everyone follow the schedule of daily Bible reading printed on this page and in larger-print half-sheets available in the Narthex (both reproduce by permission the Daily Lectionary from *Lutheran Worship*, pp.295-299). This Daily Lectionary gets you through the whole Bible over the course of one year. Regardless of what plan, if any, you follow, the important thing is being in God's Word on a daily basis. And, regardless of what you are reading in the Bible, you are welcome to ask me questions about your reading, such as the following question and answer.

Q: In Judges 19, why does the Levite's father-in-law continue urging him to remain another day? Furthermore, why does the author even mention this event, as it seems unrelated to the subsequent story about the Levite's concubine and Israel's war against Gibeah?

A: I will readily admit that the reading of Judges 19-21 on June 20th is among some of the more puzzling and disturbing reading of the whole Bible. The chapters are the second part of the book's Epilogue, which is said to illustrate "Israel's moral corruption by telling of the degenerate act of the men of Gibeah" and its defense "by the rest of the tribe of Benjamin against the Lord's discipline through the Israelites, until nearly the whole tribe was destroyed" (so the *Concordia Self-Study Bible*, p.357). Note also, as I have written elsewhere, that the involvement of the tribes of Benjamin and Dan in the corrupt events of the Epilogue is notable because the tribes also provided deliverers whose narratives open and close the central section of the book: namely, Ehud and Samson. The events in Judge's final three chapters are all closely connected, as the late departure from the concubine's father's house seems at least indirectly to result in what happens to the Levite and his concubine, and so shows the degeneration of Gibeah, which in turn leads to the rest of Israel's fighting the Benjamites, and so also to their tribes' surviving men's need for wives. As for precisely why the father-in-law continued to urge the Levite and his concubine to stay longer, Scripture does not explicitly say, but commentators speculate that the couple's previous separation probably disgraced the family and so the father-in-law may have been glad for the prospect of a reunion and been exhibiting elaborate hospitality not only in keeping with the culture of the day but also possibly as an attempt to make up with the man for his daughter's misconduct, although they appear at some point to already have been reconciled. Finally, as I have written elsewhere, note that in God's grace and mercy He provided for a remnant that could preserve the tribe of Benjamin and that, no matter the degree of corruption then or now, the Lord always reconciles His people in Christ and preserves a faithful remnant, even as those who should be His people become as corrupt as the pagans of the world.
