Jesus paid and the Father accepted the price of your soul

Dear Members and Friends of Pilgrim Lutheran Church,

What is the value of a human life? Slavery is illegal, so there is not exactly an open market for supply and demand forces to work to come to a price. Philosophically and judicially we might say that life is priceless, but in our secular society estimates must be made for various reasons, and those estimates can range from \$50,000/year of a quality life up to nearly \$8 million.

Recently, in the Gospel Reading for the Second Sunday in Lent (Mark 8:27-38 ESV), we heard Jesus ask a question similar to the question asking the value of a human life, "What can a man give in return for his soul?" In that passage, Jesus does not answer the question explicitly, but the Psalm verse to which He seems to be referring does have an answer of a sort: "Truly no man can ransom another or give to God the price of His life, for the ransom of their life is costly and can never suffice, that he should live on forever and never see the pit" (Psalm 49:7-9 ESV).

Truly, as we hear in the Gospel Reading for Fifth Sunday in Lent (Mark 10:32-45), Jesus came to serve by giving His "one" life as a ransom for "many" people, that is to say, "all" people. As we traditionally teach our catechumens, Jesus had to be truly human so that He could die, and Jesus had to be truly God so that His death could atone for the sins of the world. We cannot give anything in return for our souls, but Jesus can and did give His life in return for our souls!

Even if in our Midweek Lenten Vespers Services this year we are not hearing the Passion narrative as combined out of the four Gospel accounts, or even as provided by one of the four Gospel accounts, the absence of such a reading need not keep us from reflecting on our Lord's suffering and death for us. Even if in our Palm Sunday Divine Service we will not also observe the "Sunday of the Passion" emphasis by reading all of St. Mark's Passion narrative that day, we will still hear St. John's Passion narrative on Good Friday (alternating with stanzas of the Lenten

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hymn, "O Sacred Heard, Now Wounded", *Lutheran Service Book* 450), provided we are present in person or virtually in order to hear that reading.

The Epistle Reading for the Second Sunday in Lent (Romans 5:1-11) described how God showed His love for us in having Christ die for us. In a published sermon illustration of that text,

Rev. Adler rightly referred to Mel Gibson's 2004 movie *The Passion of the Christ* as vividly, if not graphically, depicting "the staggering price Jesus paid to redeem us". Rev. Adler went on correctly to say, "The justifying and reconciling Passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus enable us to hope in the glory of God even in the face of suffering" (*Concordia Pulpit Resources*, 34:2, p.4).

Indeed, Jesus's resurrection can be taken in part as a sign that God the Father accepted Jesus's sacrifice objectively on our behalf in general and also subjectively on our behalf in particular, when the Holy Spirit leads us to be sorry for our sinful nature and all of our actual sin and to trust God to forgive us for Jesus's sake. God's forgiveness that comes by grace for Jesus's sake through faith in Him also brings life and salvation, and so we have the sure and certain hope of the resurrection of our bodies and the blessed reunion in heaven with all those who have gone before and come after us in the faith.

Of course, even now, we who are baptized and absolved are united and have fellowship with them and with one another in the Body of Christ: in the Body of Christ that is the Church but especially also in the Body and Blood of Christ in the bread and wine of the Sacrament of the Altar. What the liturgy says is true about our joining with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven, lauding and magnifying and evermore praising the Triune God Who has put such a great value on each one of us whom He created, redeemed, and even now sanctifies.

All these themes are emphasized in services at Pilgrim this month as Lent becomes Easter. All are invited to and welcome at our regular Sunday morning Divine Services at 10:45 a.m.; our Midweek Lenten Vespers Services Wednesdays March 6, 13, and 20 at 7:00 p.m.; our Holy (Maundy) Thursday Divine Service March 28 at 7:00 p.m.; and our Good Friday Divine Service March 29 at 7:00 p.m. There also are midweek Soup/Salad Suppers and an Easter Breakfast and Egg Hunt, in addition to our regular Sunday School and Adult Bible Classes—see all the details on the calendar that follows in this newsletter, and I will pray that I will see you this month at Pilgrim!
